1. Key updates

NEW Register to order coronavirus tests for your employees

- An online portal has been launched to make it easier for business in the private sector find out more about offering rapid testing in the workplace.
- NHS Test and Trace is working to support any business with more than 50 employees who have staff who have to leave their home for work.
- Testing is also being delivered locally by local authorities in England under the Community Testing Programme.

NEW Mandatory hotel quarantine to be introduced from 15 February

- From 15 February anyone travelling to the UK from a country on the UK's <u>travel ban list</u> will be required to quarantine in a government-approved facility for 10 days.
- Further details are due to be set out this week on how passengers will be able to book into the designated accommodation facilities.

NEW Bounce Back Loan - new payment flexibilities 08/02

- Bounce Back Loan borrowers will now have the option to tailor payments according to their individual circumstances.
- Pay as You Grow repayment flexibilities now provide businesses with the following options to:
 - Extend the length of the loan from six years to ten
 - Make interest-only payments for six months, with the option to use this up to three times throughout the loan
 - Pause repayments entirely for up to six months
- The scheme is open to applications until 31 March 2021.

NEW Developing your Creative Practice: Apply by 18 Feb.

- Round 9 of our Developing your Creative Practice (DYCP) fund, run by Arts Council England, closes at 12pm on Thursday 18 February.
- DYCP supports individuals who are cultural and creative practitioners and want to take time to focus on their creative development.

Prime Minister's statement to the House of Commons on coronavirus: 27/01

- Lockdown measures to be reviewed in mid-February.
- Week commencing 22nd February Government intends to set out the results of that review and publish the plan for taking the country out of lockdown.
- The PM hopes it will be safe to commence reopening schools from Monday 8 March, with other restrictions being removed then or thereafter as and when the data permits.

Libraries Services Recovery Toolkit

The Libraries Connected Toolkit has been revised to reflect the new national lockdown restrictions. Public libraries are able to offer:

- Home Library Service (doorstep delivery, no-contact service).
- School Library Service (doorstep delivery, no-contact service).
- Order & Collect services (on a no-or low contact basis).

- Digital and remote services including eLending, online events and activities and keep in touch calls.
- Certain types of education or training (as defined in the Regulations).
- Essential voluntary services or public support services, including digital access to public services, the provision of food banks or other support for the homeless or vulnerable people, blood donation services or support in an emergency.
- Public elections and related activities.

Library staff regarded as key workers during lockdown

Decisions about what services will be offered within each area is the responsibility of the relevant library authority (or organisation responsible for a public library in the case of community managed libraries), and should be based on robust risk assessments, involving those working in libraries and unions, with a view to ensuring the safety of both those providing the service and service users.

Cabinet Office has confirmed that people providing these library services can be regarded as key workers during this period. The Minister has provided a letter to confirm that library workers count as key/critical workers in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. This helps those delivering these frontline services to take advantage of school provision in an area; and also clarifies to those charged with enforcing the regulations that people travelling to operate these services are doing so legitimately.
